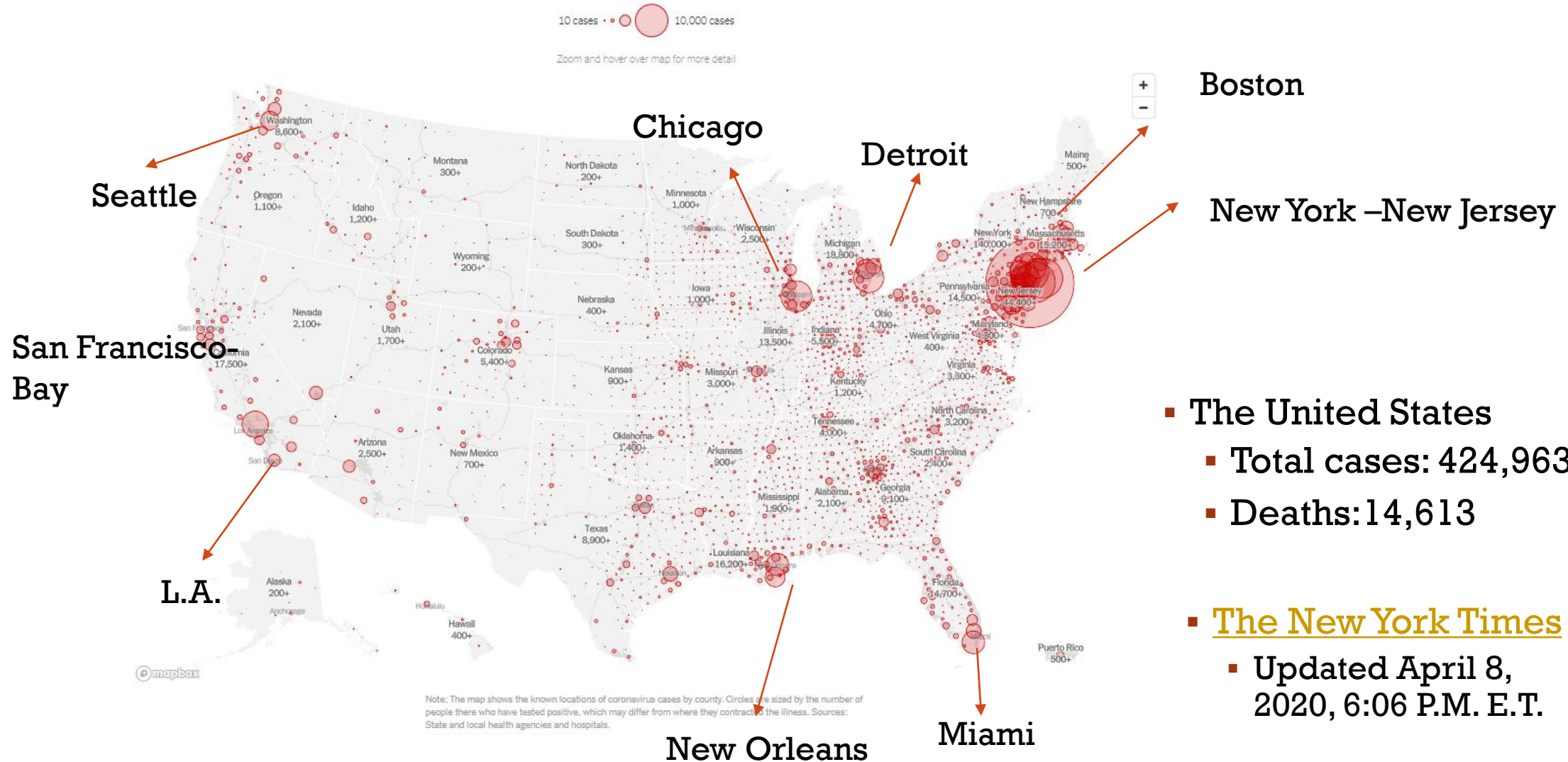

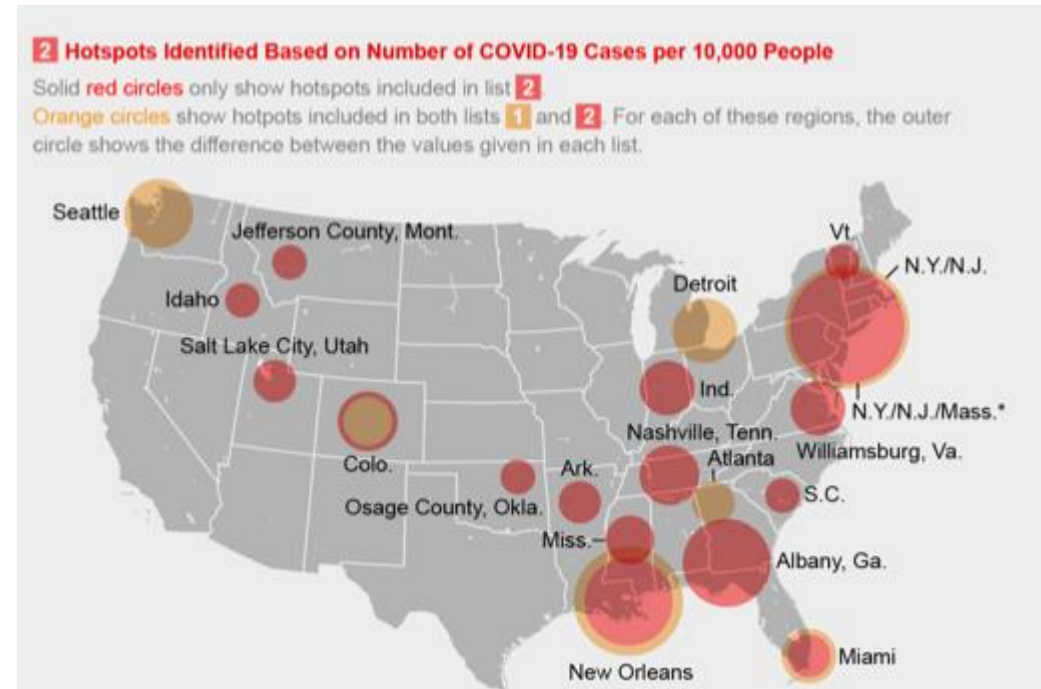

- Based on number of cases per 10,000 people

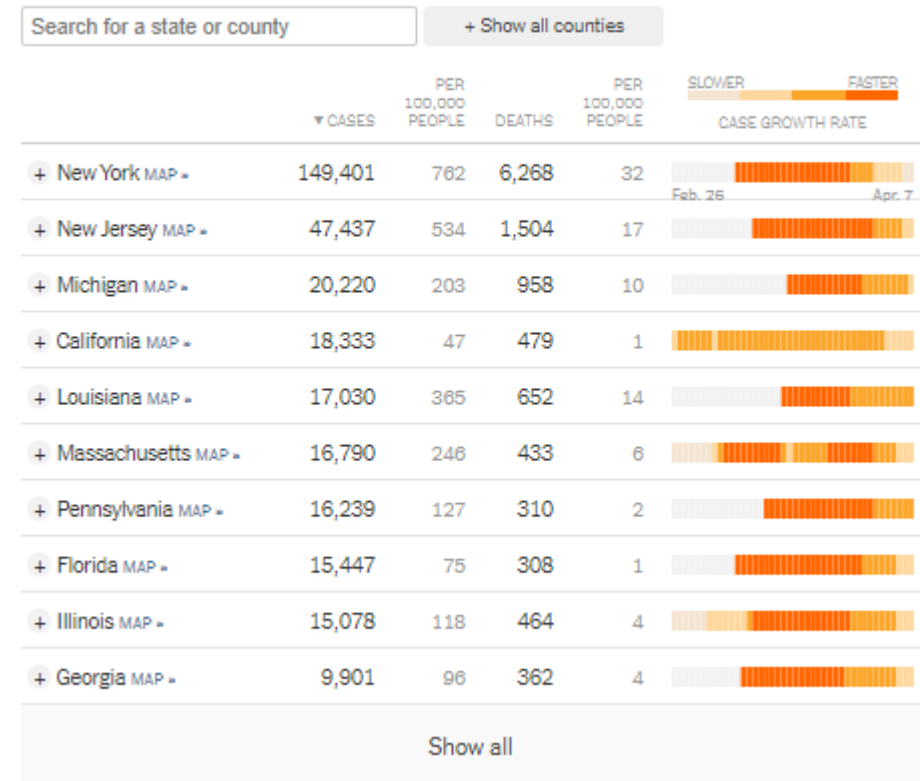

Cases and deaths by state and county



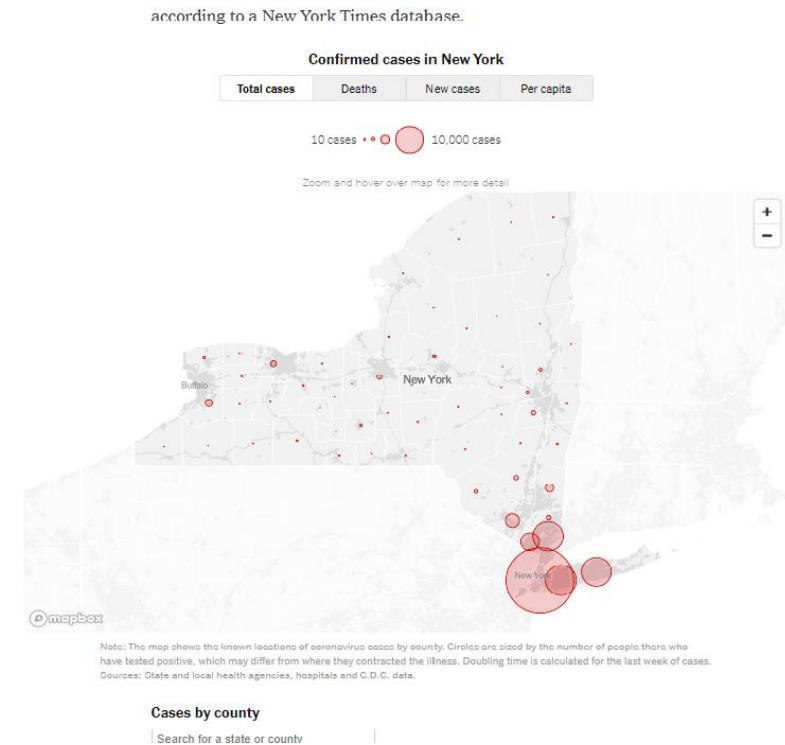

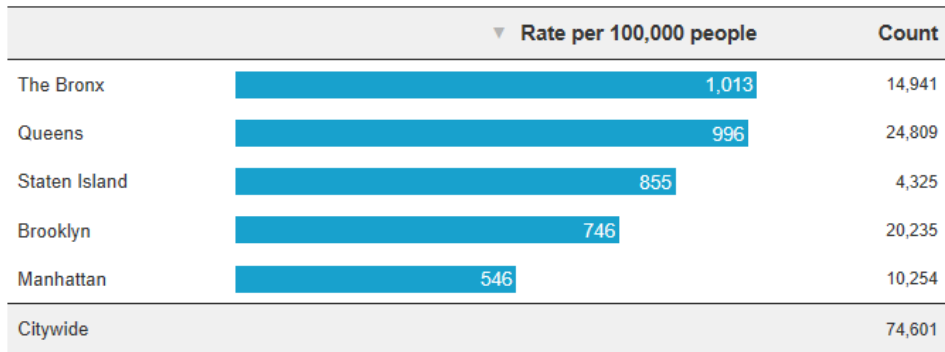

This chart shows the number of positive cases per 100,000 people in each borough. It indicates the spread of COVID-19 relative to each borough's population.



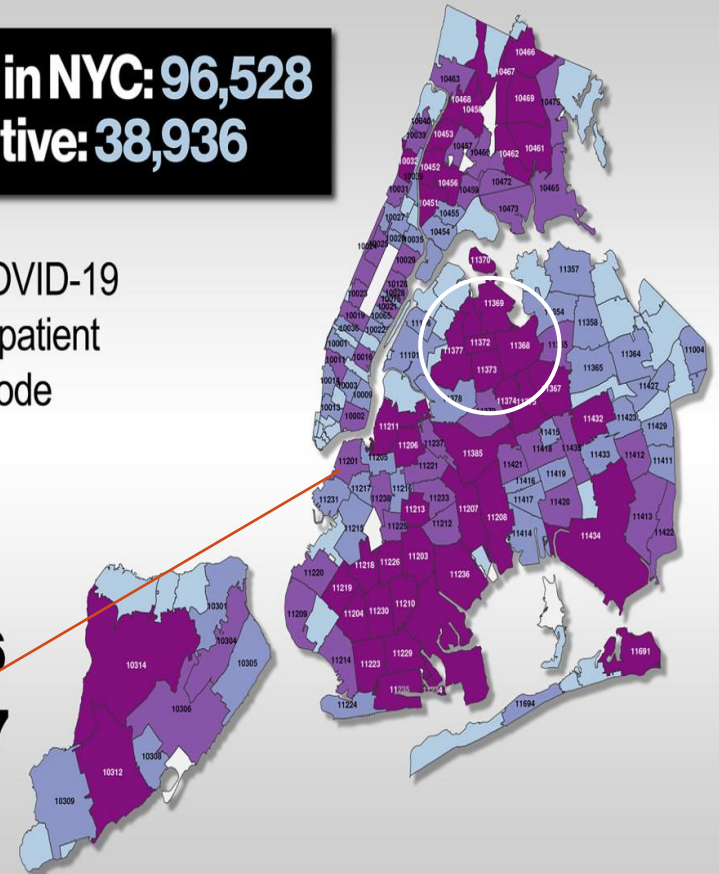

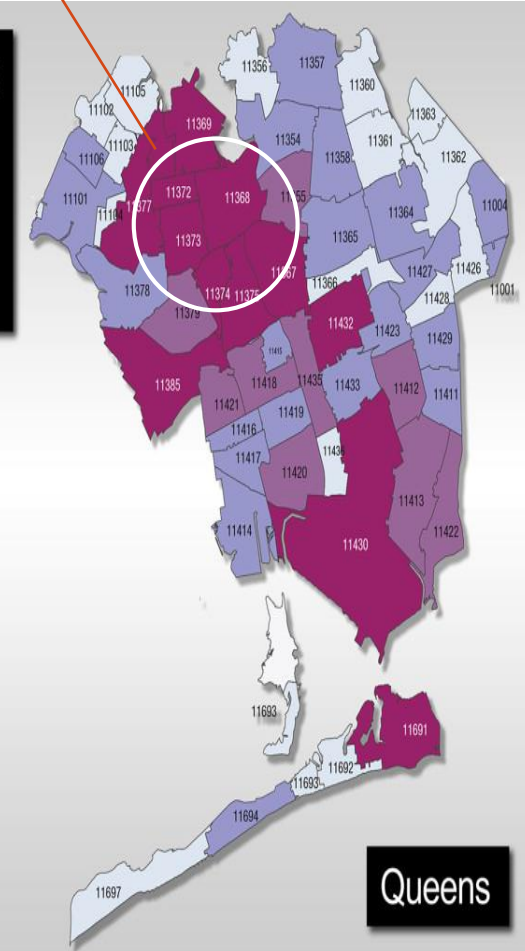

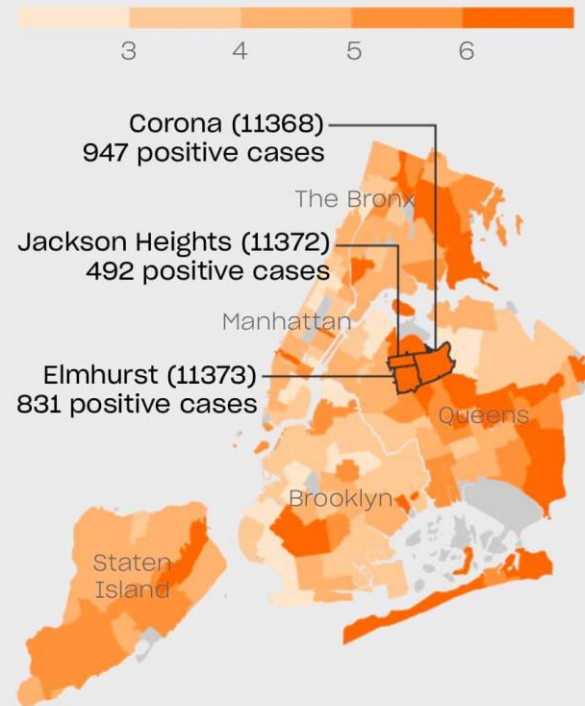

  **Demise of three Queens hospitals 11 years ago adds to pain of borough's coronavirus tragedies**

- Lack of hospitals
 - Queens – 9 hospitals
 - Brooklyn - 15 hospitals /Manhattan 20 hospitals
- Lack of hospital beds
 - 1.66 beds per 1,000 residents in Queens
 - 2.18 in Brooklyn /5.67 in Manhattan

CLASS & RACE MATTER

- Corona, Elmhurst and Jackson Heights
 - Queens VS. gentrified Brooklyn:
 - 4 times higher in Queens
 - Immigrant and working-class and low-income families.
 - Large (sometimes multiple) families in a small apartment
 - Harder to be quarantined

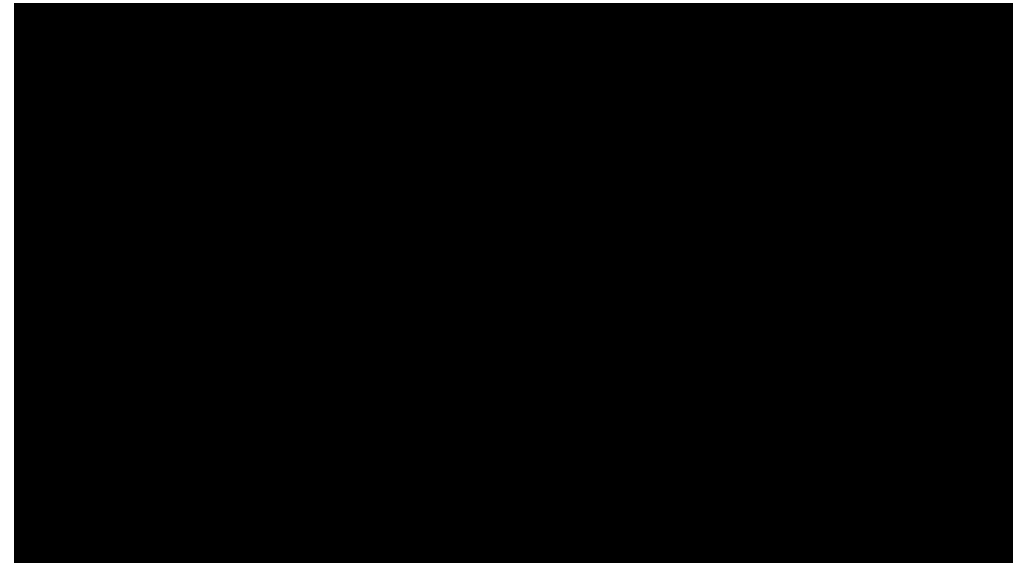

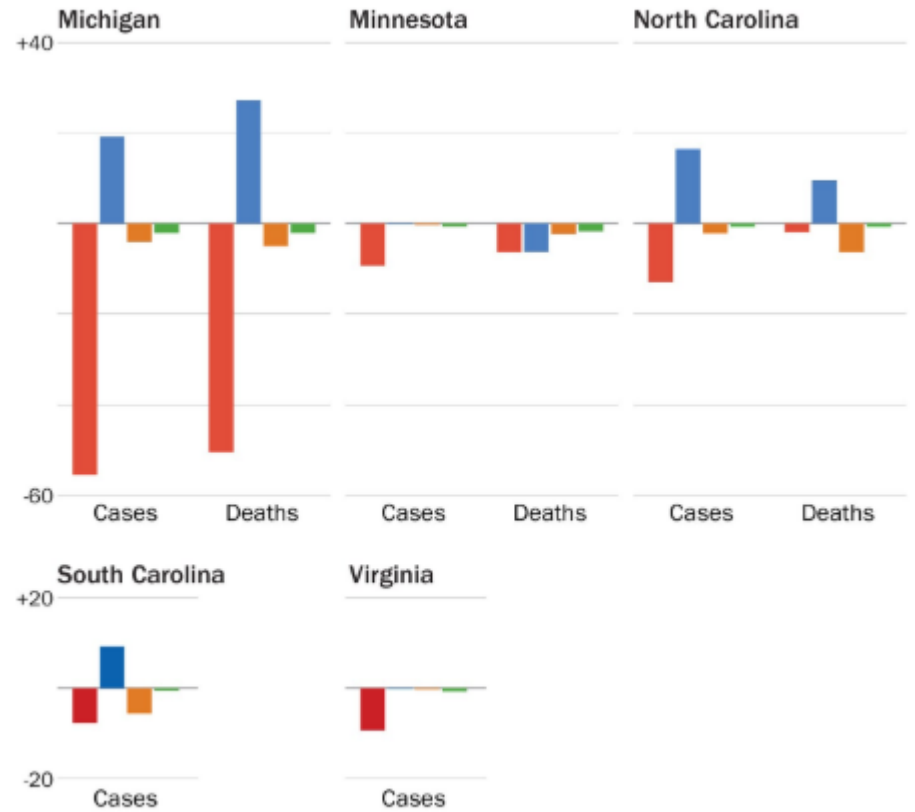
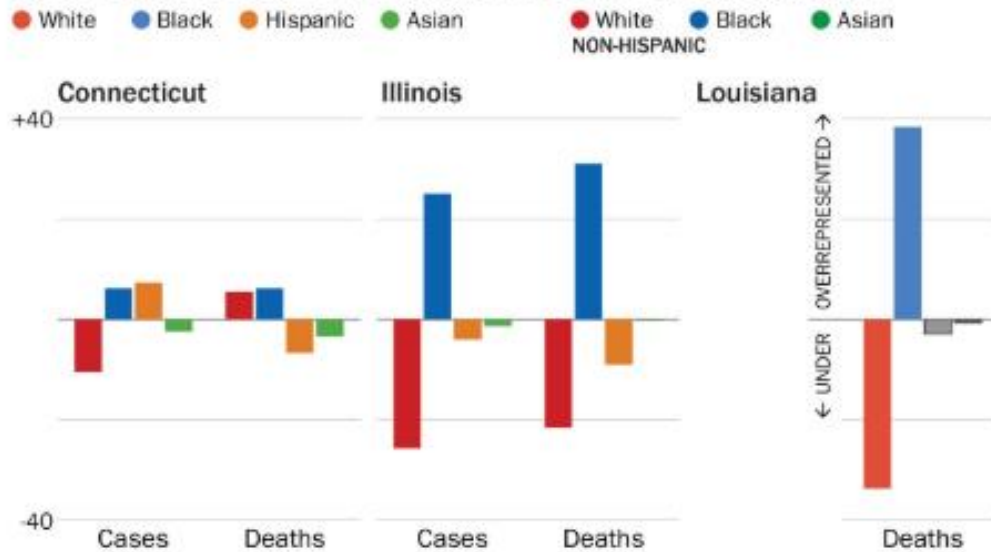
- 2/3 of New York City population- renters

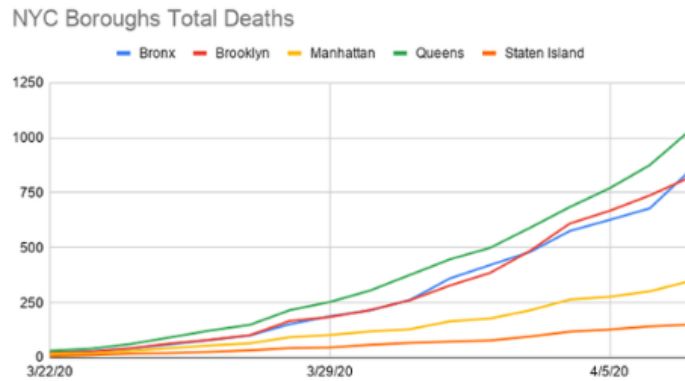

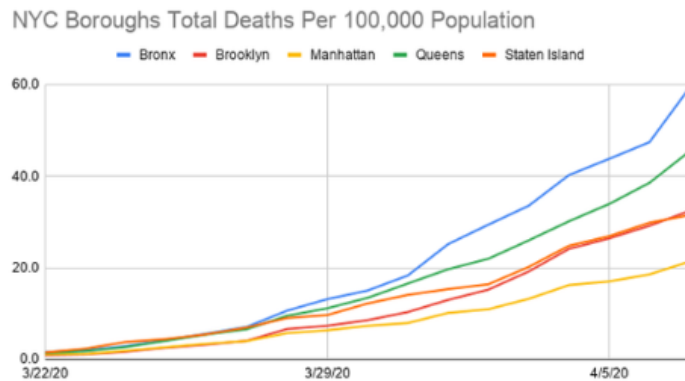

 - Black: 70% of Chicago's death from COVID-19
 - (29% of Chicago's population)

 - Death rate in New Orleans
 - 37.93 per 100,000 people as of April 3
 - 18.86 per 100,000 people in New York City
 - 70% of deaths in Louisiana Black
 - (32% of the population in the state)
 - Health conditions among residents
 - High rates of obesity, diabetes, hypertension, heart disease and kidney disease.

 - Particularly Detroit
 - 77% of the city population—black

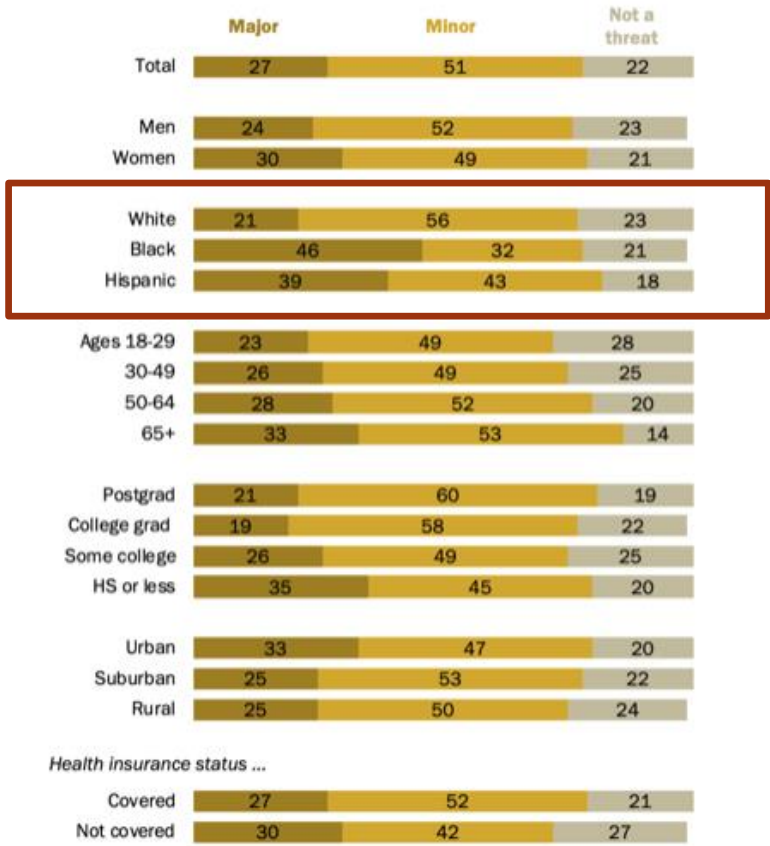

- **Farm workers**

- **Undocumented immigrants**
 - Over 4 percent of the country's labor force (7 million)
 - Little job security
 - Lost jobs in construction, restaurants and other service sectors
 - No paid sick leave
 - Not able to have the federal relief fund
 - Many of them pay taxes by using Individual Tax Identification Number (ITIN)
